



St. Thomas Anglican

This church in Moose Factory, built in 1858, is the only church in Canada to be pushed off its foundation by ice and float away. The incident in 1912 prompted residents to drill holes in the floor and insert cork plugs. Should the water rise in the future, the plugs can be pulled out and the church can fill with water and remain stationary. Moose hide and headwork altar cloths can be seen but these are fragile and should not be touched or handled. The cemetery behind the church has graves which are more than 300 years old.

Enjoy Cochrane's Parks

In the very heart of the town is a 55-acre lake, named **COMMANDO** after an Indian chief who, years ago, camped many summers with his tribe upon its shores.

Three municipal parks—**Memorial, Queen Elizabeth and Centennial Fountain**—are on the lake shores. Come summer, its fine swimming beach serves visitors as well as the townspeople. Experienced instructors of the Cochrane Recreation Committee teach organized classes.

The **Miniature Marathon Swim** held each year on the Civic Holiday (first Monday in August) draws contestants from all parts of Northern Ontario. All visitors are welcome—to watch or compete. Swans make their home on the lake, often kept company by wild duck families and the occasional Canada goose.

DRURY PARK on the south boundary of the town is a Municipal Approved Park of 75 acres, including **Hector and Norman Lakes**. Enter by park road running east just as motorist turns into town from Trans-Canada Highway.

Available are 150 camp sites, picnic tables, running water, toilet facilities; areas for tents and trailers. Camping fee \$6.00 per night. \$7.00 per night with Hydro.

Fully modern service building with toilet and showers. The Hudson's Bay packet trail passed through this area, and the first railway surveyors camped here. The trees are older than most in the district, the great fires having by-passed the park area when they devastated the surrounding country.

Supervised playgrounds serve the children of both town and the Township of Glackmeyer—and visiting

families.
