DEPARTS OF PIONEER WOMEN

Mrs. CATHERINE CHAPMAN
 One of the pioneer women, Mrs. Catherine Chapman passed away at the home of her daughter in Cochrane. She was in her 85th year. Mrs. Chapman came with her husband and three children to Clute during the summer of 1915 from Lethbridge, Alta. After her husband's death nearly six years ago, she and her son James carried on at their farm in Clute.

For many years, Mrs. Chapman has not been a well woman. Coughs came her much trouble. Nevertheless she was always a cheerful worker. On February 4 she slipped on the ice and suffered a fracture in the upper arm. She was taken to Lady Duffry Hospital and from there to her daughter's home in Cochrane. The shock proved too much for her frail body. She leaves one other son, Eric, employed by C.N.R. and who resides in Cochrane also.

The funeral service was conducted Sunday in Clute United Church, by Rev. J. A. O. Hall of Cochrane, interment being made in Clute cemetery. There were many floral offerings. The pallbearers were Messrs. H. Chapman, R. Moore, J. Scott, A. Stiles, A. W. Golding and R. A. Dadds.

A staunch church member, Mrs. Chapman will be missed by her many friends and neighbors in Clute.

On November 29th, Mrs. A. Lupton died at the age of 84. She was the oldest resident of Clute and had been an active and loved member of the W.I. until her last illness. Surviving are four sons, two in England and three daughters. Funeral services conducted by Rev. John Ford, of Cochrane, was held in Clute church on Monday, December 2nd, and interment was made in the cemetery at Clute.
