Mrs. Steel is selling \$2 raffle tickets towards the \$5-million target of the Terry McKerrow CAT Scan Operating Fund.

The non-profit fund seeks to raise enough money to set up a permanent pool of cash from which interest could be drawn to pay a CAT scan's annual operating costs, estimated at \$350,000 or more.

The diminutive, blue-eyed woman is pushy but polite.

"I finally give in, if they have a good, plausible excuse," she says, laughing.

The raffle is for two donated artworks: an Arlie Hoffman watercolor of an ice break-up at Sunset Point on Lake Nipissing, and a numbered print by Richard Kamalatisit of an aboriginal man walking with sled dogs in an icy landscape.
