Mrs. Steel is selling \$2 raffle tickets towards the \$5-million target of the Terry McKerrow CAT Scan Operating Fund.

The non-profit fund seeks to raise enough money to set up a permanent pool of cash from which interest could be drawn to pay a CAT scan's annual operating costs, estimated at \$350,000 or more
