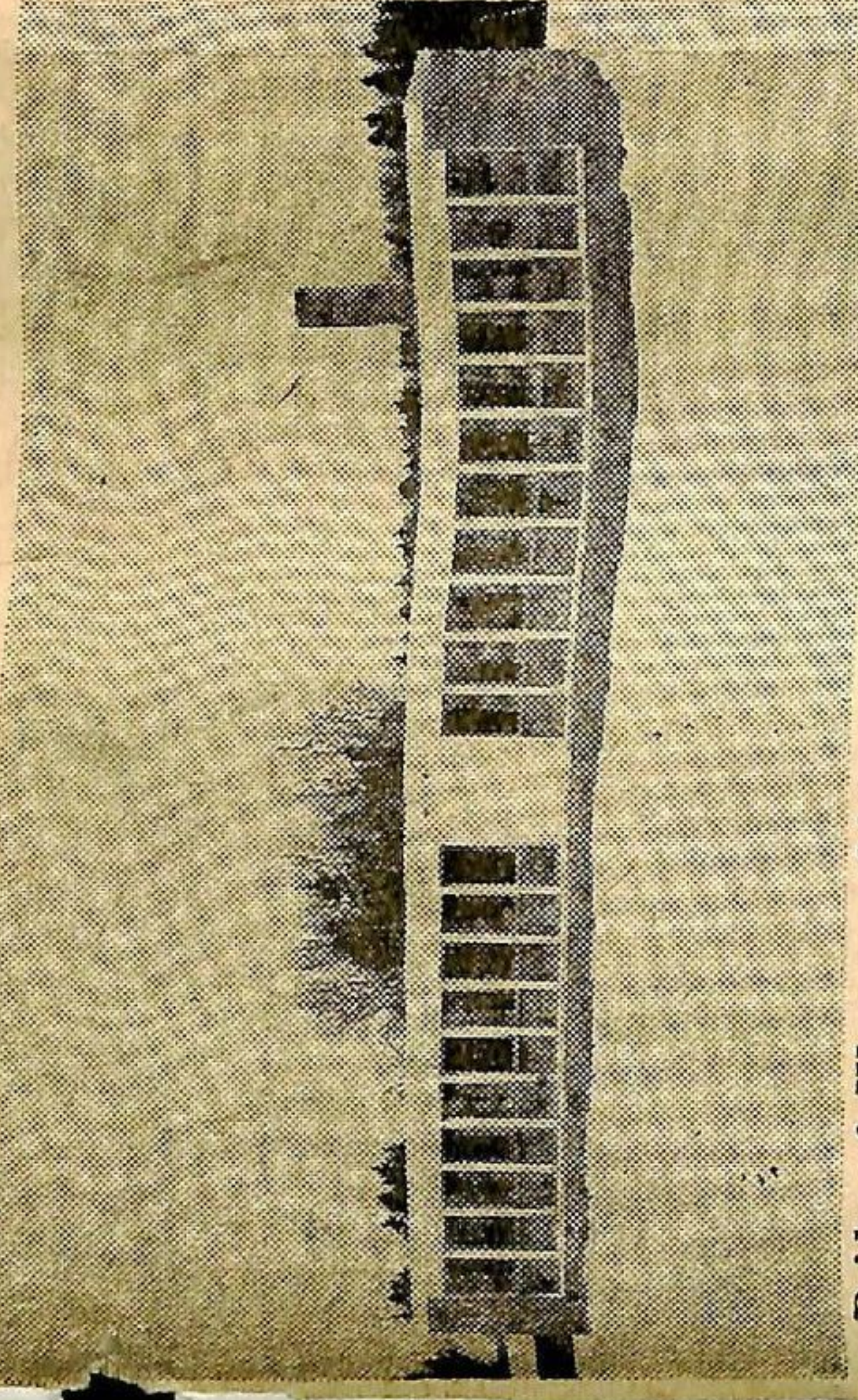
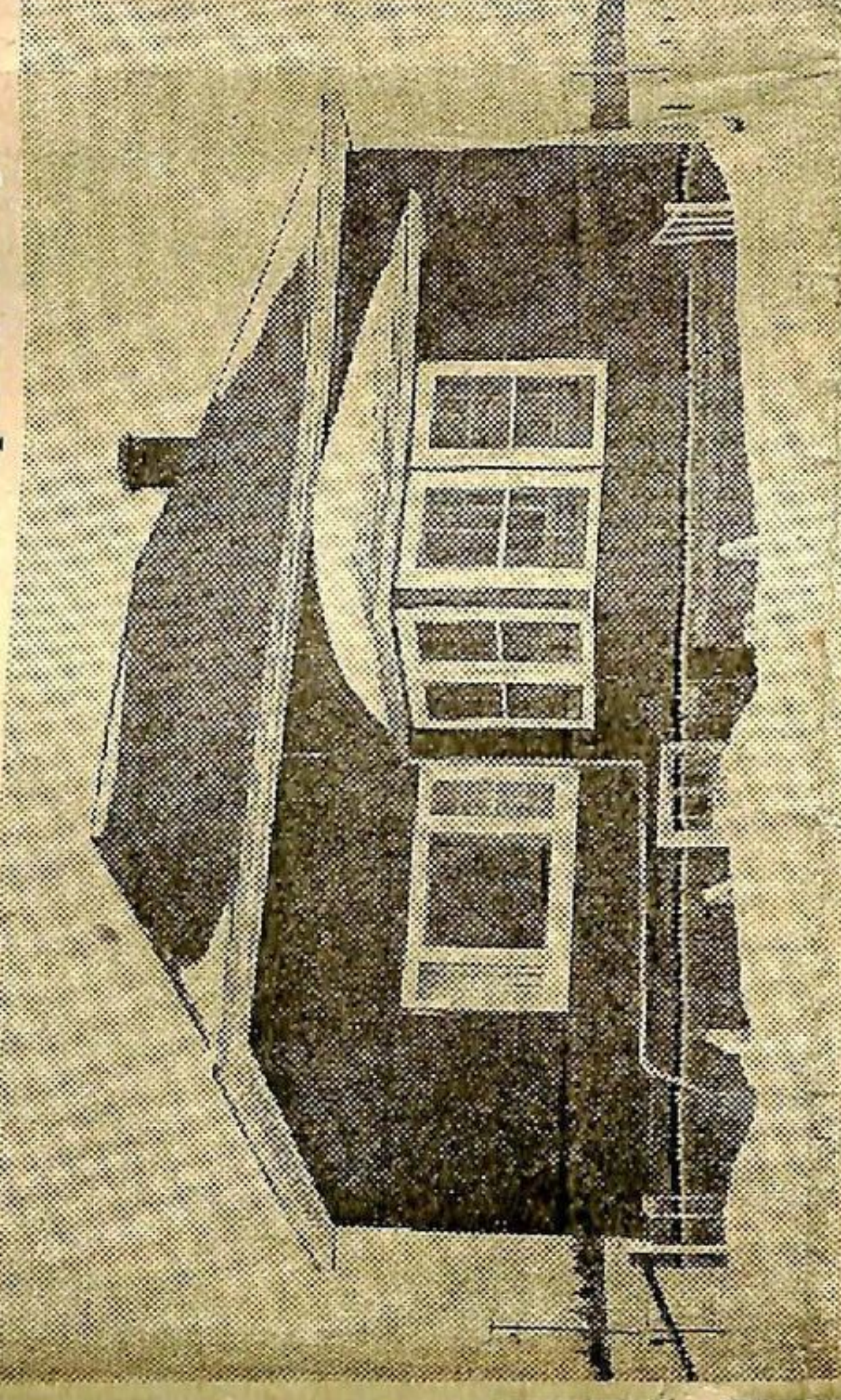


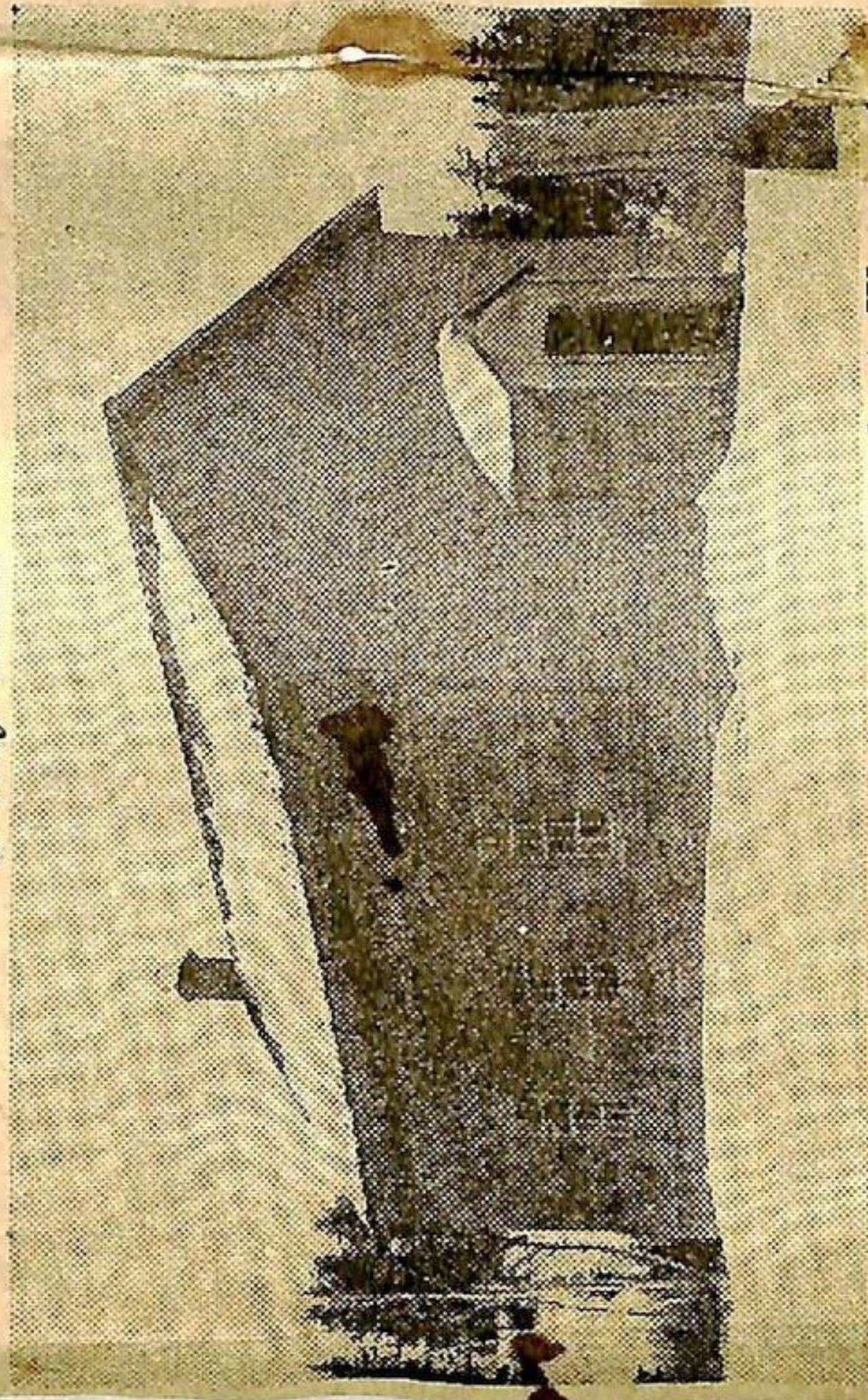
Just a Memory on District Scene

studies at local high schools. The transportation of pupils to elementary schools was extended, and in almost all districts boards provided transportation to the nearest secondary school as well. The trustees accepted this responsibility willingly although the cost was high in many cases. The result is that today we have 526 children being transported to central schools, and 378 pupils being transported to secondary schools. This latter group is securing an education that was formerly impossible.

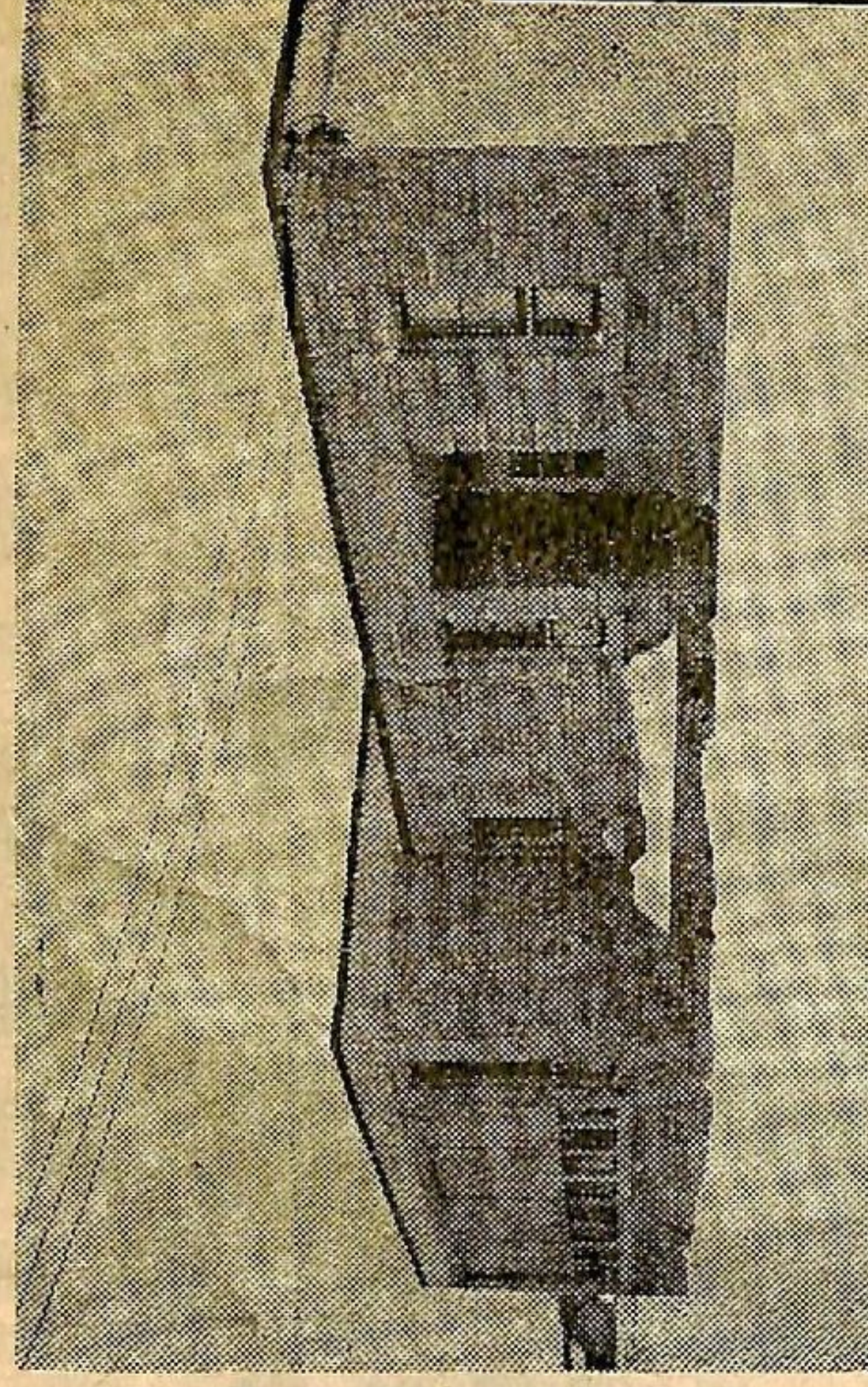
Large buses ply the main highways carrying High School students to Cobalt, North Bay, Sturgeon Falls, Powassan, Loring, and Mattawa. Graduates, who have recently been given this advantage, are coming out of our high schools, and training as nurses, teachers, stenographers and in some cases, going on to the universities to take courses in medicine, law, engineering and theology. They owe a great deal to those far-sighted, courageous, and progressive trustees who are administering our schools and to the teachers who have inspired them to further study.

There has been progress over the years but the fight has not yet been won nor the goal attained. The shortage of teachers has increased and this will constitute a real problem in providing a full and complete education for all boys and girls in this area. It has to be faced, however, but the men and women who supported the township school area, brought about some measure of centralization, and improved the school accommodation, will meet this new challenge as calmly and fearlessly as in the past.

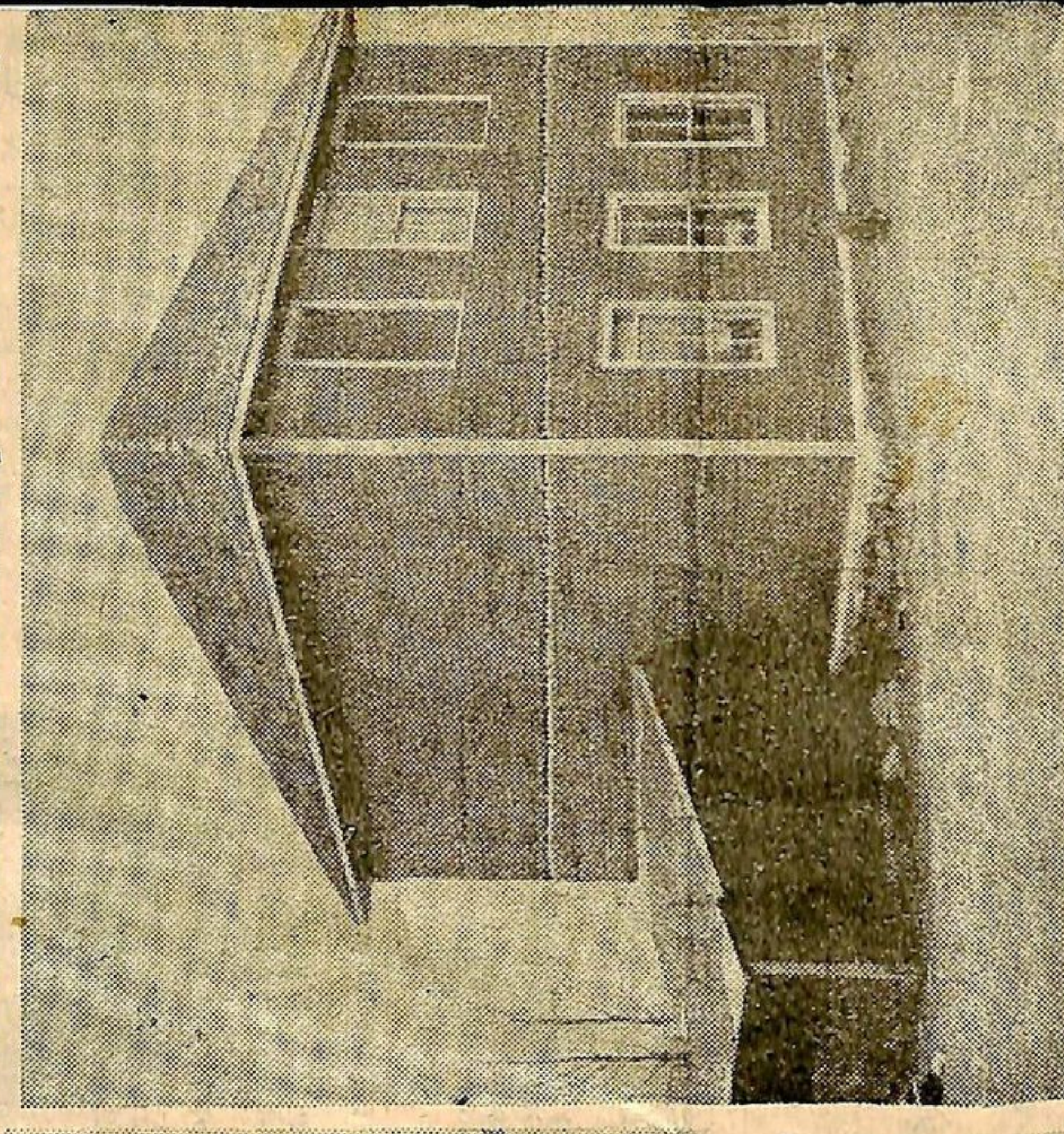
The task of the trustees has not always been easy. It is true they have received great assistance from the Department of Education through payment of liberal grants,

but they have had to face local criticism on many occasions from those who deride the benefits of an education, criticize educational expenditures, and measure everything on a dollar basis. 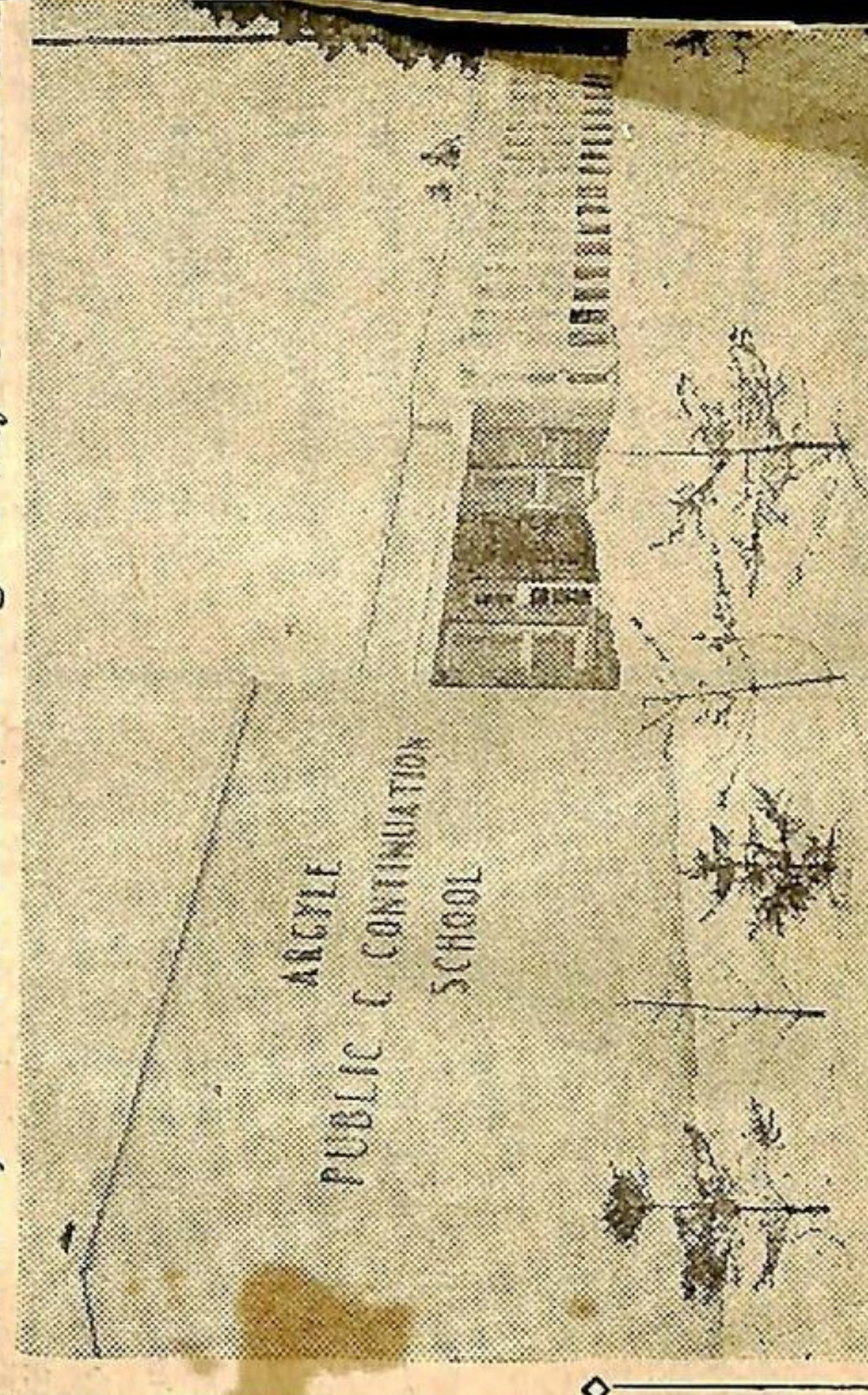

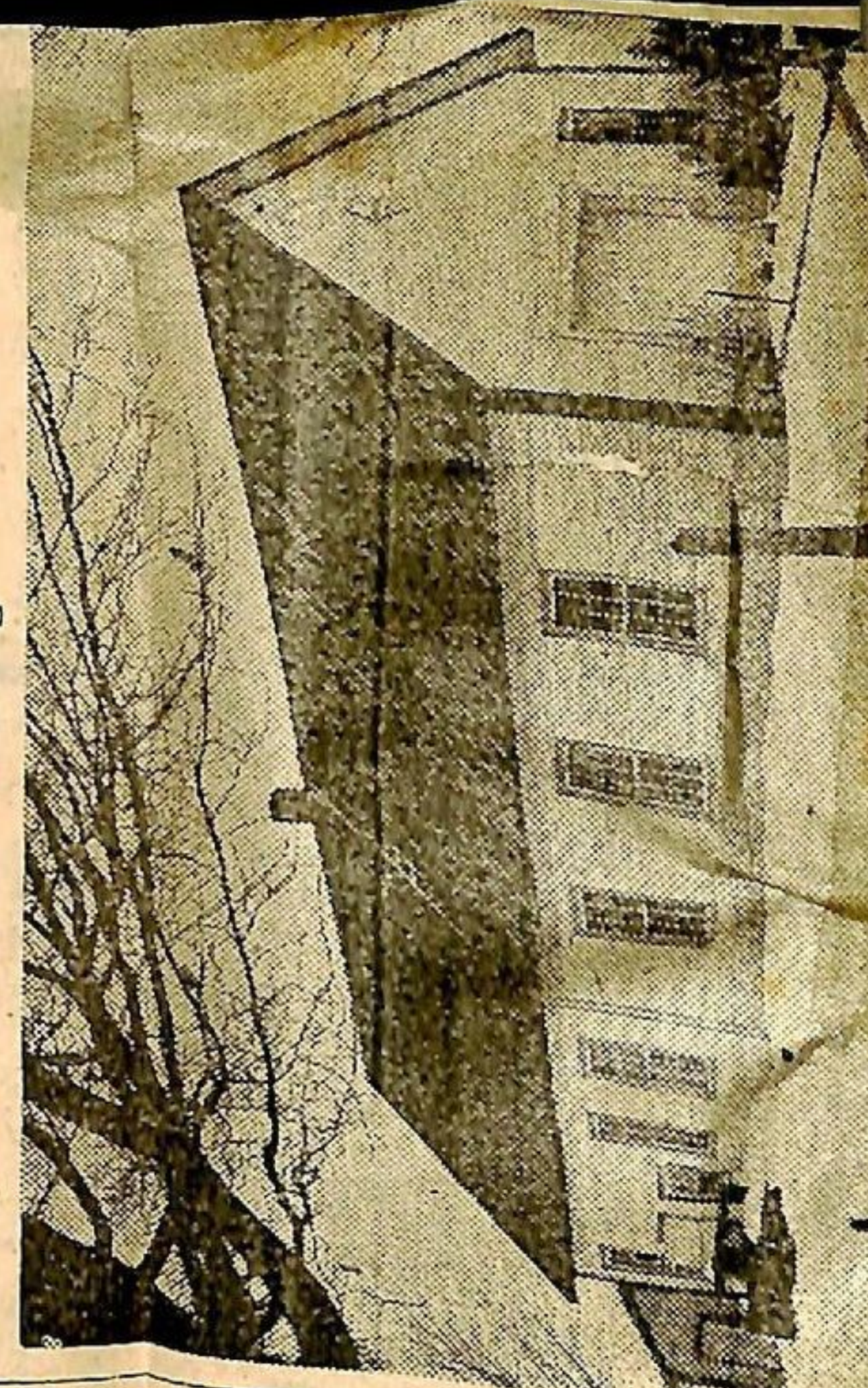
Model school at Trout Mills replaces structure below
