

Address by "Miss Mary A. Clarke on "Far Horizons"
 If men and women had not had "visions" - that is "far horizons" many things would not have been done. Our Women's Institute has grown from one branch to (about) 1385 branches in Ontario alone, and we see our branch as a link in the Associated Country Women of the World. She urged us to keep broadening our horizons mentally - keep watching for things which are new - keep in touch with needs nearby. Standing Committees had been a step forward in W. Institute work. Girls' work has gone a long way - proving very beneficial to girls and their homes. Encourage and support this work.

Address: Mr. J. Bradette M.P.
 Although short notice was given Mr. Bradette his address was very stirring. He feels that Women's Institutes should consider that what has been accomplished by them has been compensation for their work and effort expended. He spoke of the Session of Canada's Parliament from which he had recently returned of Canada's entry into the war - a war of Nazism against Christianity. There must be no profiteering but everyone of the Nation doing his or her part to promote the nation's welfare.
