

and their value in the inspiration they give to all W. I. workers. By using figures she gave us an outline of the splendid service given to the local Institutes by the W. I. Department, at Toronto, in the number of courses in the different subjects, speaker service, Officers Rally, etc. She said the grant given to local Institutes was to be used for Education or the promotion of Agriculture. She spoke, also, on the great influence the Institutes have in moulding public opinion (1) In the homes (2) In the Community (3) In the country. We should train our children to have certain responsibilities - easy at first - later on harder ones. Institute members should be loyal to their officers, and each should be willing to do her part by making a contribution to the monthly programme. The Institutes should set an example in co-operation. Keep Institute work in harmony Co-operate with other organizations. Keep up the morale of the Community. Help the schools. Study the govt and stand behind it, so that we may help in those times.

Mrs. Walter Little spoke on Loyalty to the Empire. In those days, we should sing "God Save the King" often. She spoke on the pioneer life of Swastika, on the work of the W. Institutes, which, she said, was the first organization of women in the North. She concludes "If we are true to ourselves, we shall be true to the God and also true to our country."
