A discussion on "War-time Activities of Women's Institutes" was led by Mrs. E. Duke. The delegates told of the different war activities in their branches showing ~~coll~~ operation with the Red Cross, the Central War Fund, Knitting and sewing for the soldiers, and sending them parcels. Some Institutes adopt a soldier with no home or relatives and write to them and send them boxes.

Miss Clarke said that children should be encouraged to save their money and buy war saving stamps.

Money from the Central War Fund of the F. W. I. & had been spent on "Furniture for the Soldiers' Recreation room at Camp Borden (2) A contribution to the Government for an Ambulance Fund (3) On wool for different Institutes who were not able to buy it (4) Apples were bought for the soldiers.

Eleven thousand pounds of jam had been made by Institutes in Southern Ontario and shipped to Overseas' soldiers by the Red Cross.

Mrs. E. Duke announced that Mrs. J. Lothian had been returned to office as Federation Director.
