Nipissing MPP Unveils Cenotaph In Mattawa Town

Mattawa, Nov. 18—In an impressive ceremony, witnessed by a large audience who braved chilly weather, Mattawa unveiled the local cenotaph with the inscription of the names of those who paid the supreme sacrifice in World War II. The names of those who gave their lives in World War I had been inscribed on the monument upon its erection some years back. The cost of the complete project has been made possible by the efforts of the Mattawa Women's Institute.

The unveiling was performed by Victor Martin, MPP, who addressed the gathering in French and English. The parade proceeded from the Legion hall led by the North Bay Piper's Band. Members of the Legion and veterans followed and were joined by pupils of the Separate and Public Schools. The parade proceeded down Main street where Mayor Frank Backer, who conducted the ceremony, took the salute at the cenotaph.

Mayor Backer introduced the speakers including Mr. Martin, Rev. C. E. Clarke of St. Andrew's United Church and Rev. Father J. R. Windle of St. Anne's Roman Catholic church.

Mrs. Stanley McMinn, president of the institute, expressed he appreciation on behalf of the ladies for the public's co-operation in making possible the inscription in memory of the deceased.

Mr. Martin stated that to try to explain a solution for the world wide conditions of today was beyond him. In fact, he added, the great statesmen of today, throughout the world were at a loss to bring about a peaceful world. He stated, "Your Mattawa heroes gave their lives that we may live in a world of peace, and it is no fault of theirs that the final goal has not been reached."

Albert Nicholls, MM, was in charge of the parade. The firing party consisted of A. J. Decaire and Hector Fitzmaurice. Among the wreaths laid by bereaved relatives were those contributed by the Province of Ontario, the Town of Mattawa, the three schools, High, Sep-

arate and Public; St. Andrew's Women's Association, the Catholic Women's League, the Mattawa Women's Institute, the Canadian Legion and individuals.
