Mensen stated that they had been questioned by various township residents as to the fairness of renting this municipal property to a municipal employee for such a low amount.

Elmy informed council he was paying a de facto rent of \$200 per month, since he had foregone a salary raise of \$150 per month in order to obtain the use of the home at \$50 per month.

Reeve Blyth said he felt that Elmy's salary should be negotiated separately from the rent of the house. "If you need a raise in salary, bring it to council at the first meeting in the new year."

Coun. Mensen asked Elmy if he would agree to pay \$200 per month for the house. Elmy said he would prefer it that way for tax purposes, so long as he could recoup his loss,
