Alanna Galt, youngest daughter of Cramahe Reeve Doug Galt and his wife, Cathy, has been chosen one of 700 from among 8,000 applicants for the Up with People

program.

Galt, who is a graduate of ENSS and is attending the University of Guelph, is one of 10 Canadian representatives in the 700-member touring complany representing 25 countries that will travel the world with Up with People next

year. Up with People is a 25-yearold concept born of the peaceand-love mentality of North American young people in the 1960s. Carrying on that tradition of international brotherhood, Up with People chooses its successful applicants from among those who are talented in the performing arts, since this is a travelling performance, but, more importantly, from among young people who demonstrate "people" outgoing. personalities.

Last week, Galt explained to Cramahe council, while her father declared a conflict of interest and vacated the table, that this will be a "unique educational experience" for her.

She explained that, to cover her travel expenses, she worked two jobs this summer and held a yard sale and a quilt raffle. She has also approached local service clubs for donations. And, she requested the support of the township council, saying that she has performed community services right at home in Salem, helping with Salem

In the end, council, under the chairmanship of Deputy Reeve Stu Oliver, in the absence of Reeve Galt, voted to give Alanna a letter of support to take with her, but there will be no grant of money.

Northumberland farms earned \$100,000,000 By D. F. YOUNG

Every five years Canadian farmers are required to take part in that exercise known as the Farm Census. Results of this census have been tabulated with various reports in the process of being released over the next two months. Here are some of the agricultural statistics as reported by Agriculture Canada.

SEPT-1/92

A total of 68,000 farms were counted in the 1991 Census in Ontario. Twentyseven percent reported cattle other than dairy with 16 percent reporting dairy. Eighty-two percent of Ontario farmers reported farm sizes between ten and 399

acres with only 11 p;ercent over 400 acres.

Twenty-seven percent reported a gross farm income in excess of \$100,000 while 29.6 percent reported gross incomes of \$9,999 or less. About 50 percent of the farms generated \$25,000 gross income.

In Northumberland, the total number of farms was reported as 1,514 with a total gross farm recept of approximately \$114,900,000. Fifteen percent reported sales of under \$2,500 while approximately 20 percent reported sales in excess of \$100,000 with 28 reporting gross sales in excess of \$500,000.

Individual or family farms were reported in57 percent of the cases across Ontario, while another 25 p;ercent were operated as partnerships without written agreements, and a furtHer 9.9 percent were partnerships with written agreements.

Only 7.4 percent were operated as family coprorations, while1.2 percent were

operated as non-family corporations.

Over 28,000 farms reported alfalfa or alfalfa mixtures while over 19,800 reported other tame hay. Twenty-one thousand and forty-one farms reported grain corn, while soybeans were grown on 14,678 farms, and silage corn on 11,097.
