Time taken away from his regular job to attend to political duties was also cited as a factor in the demand for his resignation.

It is customary for the municipality Although regret was from which the warden comes to have a banquet in his or her honor during the warden's one-year term. Normally politicians from across the county are invited to be present, and this warden's banquet was no exception in that respect.

Northumberland MP Christine Stewart was among the speakers. She told Galt that not only his rights, "but the rights of all of us," had been infringed upon by the enforced resignation.

Her statement provoked a hearty round of applause.

Stewart had said at the time of Galt's announcement that forcing him to resign was contrary to the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms.

Northumberland MPP Joan Fawcett said she had come to bring greetings from the Province of Ontario, but, she admitted, "I don't suppose you give two hoots about the Province of Ontario right now."

Her remark was greeted with loud cheers.

Colborne Reeve Walter Rutherford had been appoint-

ed to bring greetings from the county and he pointed out that Doug Galt's leadership will be missed at the county.

Rutherford added that the "worst part," of the year, the budget process, was over, and said it was a pity that Galt was not to be allowed to finish his term, which would normally have ended in December.

Other speakers included Galt's longtime friend, Jack Honey; his daughter, Alana; Port Hope Reeve Gloria cle, Tuesday, May 18, 1993 Spence-Schlegel, who nominated him for Warden, Cramahe Deputy Reeve Stu Oliver, Cramahe Councillors George Blyth, Howard Whaley and Jim Williams and past county wardens Joan Chalovich of Cobourg, Ken Ferguson Brighton of Township and Bill Petherick of Seymour.

The county's current warden, Don Clarke, who was acclaimed after Galt's resignation, was present but did not speak.

Galt himself made a lengthy address in which he thanked members of the county and township staffs, fellow council members, the press and his family for their support, both while he was in municipal politics and upon his resignation.

Although the occasion could have descended into sadness or bitterness, it was obviously
