Computer work-station for public CIBC's gift to local library

The Colborne Public Library is part of the wired world.

Thanks to a donation from the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce (CIBC), patrons of the library can now enjoy computer access to the wide and wired world.

A new public-access computer work-station, donated by the local bank branch, is now in operation at the library.

Librarian Pat Johnston said last week that the computer gives the user access to Encarta Encyclopedia 1996, on CD-ROM, as well as the Canadian Encyclopedia Plus, with Gage Canadian Dictionary and Atlas.

That should be very helpful to students researching projects for homework, but it is by no means exclusively for them.

Anyone can book time, in half-hour segments, to use the work-station.

To help new computerusers, the work-station
comes equipped with a
Mavis Beacon Typing
Tutorial to improve keyboarding skills, and it also
offers recreational pursuits such as ChessMaster
("Take on the pros," Ms.
Johnston invites) and
Trivia Maze.

For engaged in jobsearches, the work station offers softwear programs to produce resumés and covering letters.

And it has a printer to produce hard copies of all research and input work.

Shelley Hollinger, chair of the Colborne Public Library Board, said the board will meet soon to establish rules and policies for the use of the work-station.

"Security will be the greatest consideration" in drafting policies, Mrs. Hollinger noted.

Last week, as the workstation was first demonstrated in the library, a proud and happy Al Vardy, manager of Colborne's CIBC branch, was present for the "unveiling."

He was impressed with the printing power of the station, and with all its capabilities.

"I am very happy that I'm able to make a difference in the community through the participation of my employer," Mr. Vardy stated.

The computer work-station is valued at about \$3,300.
