Tiverton Youth Dies Instantly Under Tractor

KINCARDINE — A 15-year-old Tiverton youth was instantly killed Monday afternoon when a tractor he was driving rolled over and pinned him beneath the back wheels. Reported dead was John Campbell son of Mr. and Mrs. Francis Campbell of Tiverton.

A cousin of the dead boy, Norman Campbell, who is also 15, discovered the accident at 1.45 p.m. when he circled around the field on another tractor and came back to the scene. Both lads were cutting clover on the farm of Howard Campbell, 2nd concession of Bruce Township, two and-one-half miles northwest of Tiverton.

Norman Campbell is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Campbell. Reports indicated that the field was hilly and it was believed that the tractor rolled over while proceeding on a slope.
