
Dinner was served to some 70 guests, while friends and relatives gathered later in the evening for a reception.

ALBERT BRUCE TAULBEE





Murdoch Matheson was a Murdoch township native, Kincardine born 21st March, having been born 21st March, having been born 21st March, 1881, on lot 9, concession 6, the 1881, on lot 9, concession 6, the 1881, on Matheson and son of MacLennan. He at-Margaret MacLennan. He at-

tended Fort McLeod School, S.S. No. 5, which at that time stood on lot 6, concession 7. From here he went to Kincardine High School, and in the fall of 1902 took the four months regular course at Kincardine Model School. He taught from January 1903 to September 1904 at Holyrood.

Murdoch was a student at heart, and gave up teaching temporarily to go to Queen's University, Kingston, where he received his B.A. in April of 1907. He taught in Saskatchewan for a year and returned to Queen's in 1908 to work for his Professional Teacher's Certificate. The next school year he spent teaching in Brampton High School, and then returned to the West to teach in Assiniboia High School.
