**Was National
W. I. President**

A past national president of the Women's Institute and the first one to visit WI's in the Northwest Territories and the Yukon, Mrs. James Haggerty died last Wednesday at Lennox and Addington County General Hospital here. She was 72.

Mrs. Haggerty was president of the Ontario Women's Institutes before serving as national president of the Federated WI's of Canada from 1961 to 1964. Lennox District Branch before becoming provincial president.

Born in North Fredericksburgh Township, daughter of the late William Herrington and his wife, Carrie, deceased was the former Anna Gertrude Herrington. She was a lifelong resident of Napanee and died after an illness of seven months.

Mrs. Haggerty was a member of Grace United Church here and her funeral was conducted by her pastor, Rev. Guy Case, at Tierney Funeral Home last Friday afternoon at two o'clock. Interment was at Riverview Cemetery. Pallbearers were nephews John Herrington, Donald Herrington, James Kimmett, Gerald Kimmett, Thomas Richmond and William Richmond.

Mrs. Haggerty leaves her husband and a daughter, Mrs. Glen Lowry (Molly), RR 3, Bath; granddaughters, Mrs. Yvonne Armstrong, Napanee, and Mrs. David Mortimer (Dianne), Amherstview, and six great-grandchildren.

She also leaves three sisters and a brother: Mrs. Mel Phillips (Hattie), of Smiths Falls; Walter Herrington, RR 6, Napanee; Mrs. Vernon Kimmett (Alice), RR 7, Napanee, and Mrs. T.E. Richmond (Sara), Roblin.

FIRST VISITOR

Mrs. James Haggerty, of Napanee, who held offices in the Women's Institute from branch level to the national presidency, was the first national president of the WI to visit the Northern Canada Women's Institutes. The Yukon and Northwest Territories came into the WI in 1957, 60 years after the first branch was formed at Stoney Creek, near Hamilton.
