History of schools is museum's subject

The Jordan Historical Museum of the Twenty will feature a special exhibit of "Schools in Lincoln", with information and artifacts on education in the community through the years.

Displayed in the Museum's 1859 stone schoolhouse, the exhibit will be particularly interesting to anyone who attended Beamsville Public School in 1937-38, as there is a school photo on display.

The schoolhouse also contains a collection of agricultural tools, blacksmith materials and butchering equipment.

At the Museum's Fry House, members of the Niagara Handweavers and Spinners Guild are using one of the looms to weave a rag rug for the kitchen exhibit at Lundy's Lane Historical Museum. Old cotton or linen clothes are welcome.

Members of the Guild will be working on the project Tuesday afternoons during August. Tea and

home baking are served at the Museum every Tuesday from 2 to 4 p.m. during July and August.

A welcome addition this summer is the heritage Gift Shop located in the Carriage House. Marie Troup, curatorial assistant, has spent several months visiting local craftspeople to stock the shop. There is a wide selection of hand-crafted items reflecting the heritage of the Niagara Peninsula.

Posters celebrating Canada's 125th birthday by local artist Brian Romagnoli are available, as well as raffle tickets on a king-size handwoven coverlet.

Another recent donation to the Museum is a small book about housekeeping on a budget, first published in 1886, titled *\$10: Enough*.

The Museum is open daily from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. during July and August.
