worked alongside her mother at Wallbank spring factory near Washington. That's where she met her future husband, Bob Trachsel, in 1961.

Leaving home that year, Winnie went to live with her mother's mother in London and worked between jobs at Carson's Ladies Wear and Birks Jewellers. Bob helped her get a job at Standard Products in Stratford and she lived with Marion and Harvey Steinman until the couple was married on October 26, 1963 at Trinity Lutheran Church in Sebastopol-Tavistock.

"Bob always wanted to farm," Winnie said. He had grown up on a farm on the county line just west of Tavistock. A few months before they were married, Bob went to a farm sale on Line 29 to buy some used furniture. When he realized he might be able to actually purchase the farm, he quickly drove down the road to speak to his grandfather, P.W. Morgenroth, who helped him finance the purchase. It wasn't until later that he learned his grandfather was born in the house on the property.

After fixing up the house, Bob and Winnie worked off the farm for two years. They then started milking Guernsey cattle, several years later changing to Holstein and adding some Brown Swiss. They lost their herd to brucellosis in 1976, but with the help of Tony Danen, rebuilt a purebred herd with cattle purchased from another herd near Lakeside.

During that time they raised their two children,

Any other free time Winnie does have, she enjoys oil painting. Self-taught, she has an eye for landscapes having produced some beautiful works that now hang proudly throughout their home.

Last week celebrated International Women's Day and Winnie is proud of what the Women's Institutes have achieved over the past 120 years. W.I.'s represent over 90 million women in 70 countries making a big contribution to women's issues around the world.

What she has learned is that we all make mistakes, but we learn from them and carry on. "And much of what I've learned I can attribute to W.I." she said.
