## Embro man dies after collapsing in silo

EMBRO — An Embro man is dead after he collapsed in a farm silo Thursday.

Ronald Douglas MacKay, 33, was working at the RR 5, Embro dairy and cash crop farm he and his brother Steve operated when the tragedy occurred, Const. Ray Dobbs of the Woodstock OPP said Friday.

The brothers were trying to fix something in the silo. At about 3:45 p.m. Steve left the silo and

wife and sister joined Steve in trying cardiopulmonary resuscitation at the scene, said investigating officer Const. Ken Aitchison.

taken to Woodstock General Hospital where he was pronounced dead by coroner Dr. Barry Singleton, said Aitchison. Singleton could not be reached for comment Friday.

The cause of death is uncertain, said Steve Zonik, public relations coordinator of the Farm Safety Association in Guelph. A lack of oxygen and poisonous gases in the silo may have been the cause, said Zonik.

"Until we get a full report we don't know exactly what happened," said Zonik. He expected more details on the cause of death would be available by the end of next week.

Tony Tenwesteneind, who graduated from the Ontario Agricultural College with Ronald in 1981, called the safety board about the death. He wants an inquiry done.

"We don't want anybody else affected by this (whatever killed Ronald)," said Tenwesteneind.

A father of two, Ronald taught agriculture at the Woodstock campus of Fanshawe College. He was a member of a number of lo-

cal farming groups, including the Oxford Soil and Crop Improvement Association. He was an avid athlete, involved in volleyball, baseball and hockey.

Friends and family described him as a true friend who will be missed by the community.

Friends will be received at the R.D. Longworth Funeral Home, 134 Riddell St., Woodstock today from 7-9 p.m. and Sunday from 2-4 p.m. and 7-9 p.m.

The funeral will be held Monday in Knox United Church, Embroat 1:30 p.m.
