The roll call "attic discoveries, what did you find?" revealed 1918 magazines, ancestors' dishes, clocks, pictures in beautiful old frames, a child's rocking horse and numerous files and dust. Some members told of the giving away or throwing out these old items back when they were young brides cleaning up the family farm home.

Verna Schlosser and Lois Freiburger gave a report of the Grey-Bruce area convention. Their report of the

speaker Rosella Clancy, the curator for the provincial level of the Women's Institute, led to the topic of the day.

Clancy stressed using acid-free paper and storing history in acid-free containers (not cardboard boxes, or the paper will pick up the acid) and wearing cotton gloves to avoid dirt and oils from the hands marring the paper.

Wanita Hollands, a member of Brant-Greenock branch, talked about the how, what, where and who of recording a family tree. She suggested starting with oneself, listing maiden name, date and place of birth, marriage, children, death, religion, education and employment. Next record the spouse, both par-

ents, siblings, etc. Record source of information for future reference.
