

New \$6,000 Windows Installed At Church

At a cost of \$6,000 the big memorial window at Brown's United Church, south of town, has been replaced.

The cost also includes the small window over the front door of the venerable church, as well as some other window work.

The windows were broken by vandals about two years

ago and have been boarded up until the new structures were ready to be installed by Edwards Glass, of London. It is understood that the original memorial window was installed by the same firm 74 years ago. The larger window was 8 by 14 feet in size and the smaller about 5 x 8 feet.

Work included removing

the damaged units, re-leading, copper bar reinforcements and sealing. A complete set of "storms" have also been installed made of plexiglass three sixteenth of an inch thick. These outer windows are sealed to the brick. Outer frames are made of aluminum.

John Hawkesworth is Clerk of Session at the church, and John Uren is Chairman of the Trustee Board. Both these leaders, and their committee members, are very happy with the work as completed and are also very pleased with the volunteer help given to those in charge by various members of the congregation. Some of this help has included carpentry, painting and washing the walls of the auditorium.

Now that the windows have been installed there is a "new light" on the interior of the church especially following the removal of the boards over the windows which the congregation had endured for the past two years.

According to George Towle of St. Marys, who is also a member at Brown's Church, the people there are not as concerned with the \$6,000 cost as they might be since some of the work was much needed anyway. But nevertheless having it all completed will no doubt be a great source of satisfaction to everyone.
