Points Out Serious Lack Of Nursing Home Beds

Rotarian Vern Tozer told his fellow Rotarians on Monday evening that the St. Marys Ministerial were very concerned about the shortage of nursing home beds in the St. Marys area. They were very interested in the nursing home situation, and hoped to pursue a course in 1977 which would lead to some improvements for the community in this regard.

He pointed out how many older people had to be sheltered in a home twenty to thirty miles away in order to find a place to spend their last years. They were taken away from former friends and neighbors who were often unable to visit them because of the distance.

Rotarian Vern. who with Rotarian Ross Crosby, spoke for the Ministerial group, said that they had been pursuing the matter with several government

agencies but had not found too much help as yet. The authorities seemed to feel that St. Marys had sufficient nursing home beds for the population hereabout, and yet in the municipality of Tavistock some 242 beds were available.

STRONG SUPPORT

The Ministerial President said that their group really needed strong support from other local organizations. He suggested that if a million dollars could be obtained for a new arena, surely half of that could be secured so that enough nursing home beds could be made available. "Most of these people are very lonely", he said, describing some of those who were in out-of-town nursing homes. "Having visitors from persons their own age is often quite a trial."

As well as making this appeal concerning the elderly citizens, Rotarian Vern, on behalf of the Ministerial extended best wishes to each Rotarian and his family. This was his own family's thirds winter in St. Marys, he said, and they were enjoying living here very much.

"MISS DEAR FRIENDS"

Rotarian Ross Crosby seconded Vern's comments concerning the nursing home situation. He said that most people had no idea of the number of persons who were confined to the out-of-town nurshing homes. He added: "Older people miss their dear friends with whom they have associated over the years.

The Club members welcomed back Rotarians Herb Sparling and Hugh Munro, both of whom have returned from lengthy hospital stays.
