This house is famous for its glorious brick work and slate roof on the exterior, and beautiful Victorian interior. This house has been designated as a property of architectural value or interest.

Also on the tour is John and Marie Stevens' home at 96 Robinson Street. Not only is this house famous for being the birthplace of the famous violinist, Nora Clench, it also commands a spectacular view of the Thames. Visitors on the house tour may be lucky enough to see Nora


Clench herself playing her violin.

Visitors will also have an opportunity to tour St. James Anglican Church Rectory, located at 199 Elgin Street East. Built in 1889, contemporary accounts of the rectory describe it as being "one of the best appointed, best built and finished houses for the money invested."

One of the oldest homes on the tour is that of Bruce and Sue Kittmer, located at 480 Queen Street West. This unique frame home has been in family of Sue Kittmer (Graham) since 1954, and is believed to have been built in the mid nineteenth century.
