Over the last month, the couple have welcomed about 23 lambs – six of whom arrived the same day – to their Medina farm, and with six more ewes pregnant, more are expected soon.


"(The barn is) as full as it's going to get," says Victor with a laugh, noting that each day he feeds the sheep and lambs at least four times, which he fits

into his schedule between his off-thefarm job.

"There's a lot of eating supper at midnight," he adds.

The Wests have been breeding sheep for the past 11 years, but Victor says there's always an element of surprise that keeps the job exciting, noting that many ewes will give birth to twins or more; he's even had one give birth to five lambs.

The Wests have about 50 ewes and two rams on the farm; Victor says he usually plans two birthing cycles each year and expects more lambs to arrive in the summer
