



SERGEANT GEORGE HALL, wireless air gunner with the R.C.A.F. who was first reported missing and later by telegram received by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Hall, it was stated that he was "missing", believed killed" over enemy waters on August 5, 1942. This picture of Sergt. Hall appeared in the Christmas issue of The Canadian Milky Way, a publication for the employees of The Borden Company, Limited. It was taken during his last leave in England. He enlisted in 1940 and started his training on Jan. 3, 1941. He received his training at Toronto, Montreal and Jarvis, going overseas on November 3, 1941. He had made many successful trips over Germany and was in a number of the 1000 plane raids. He was a member of the Brownsville Baptist church. In his 23rd year, he was beloved by all who knew him. He attended Brownsville Public School and the Tillsonburg High School. Besides his parents, three brothers, Harold of Tillsonburg, Pte Norman Hall of Chatham and Signalman Eddie Hall, who is overseas.
