

Pvt. Donald Mulholland
Brownsville arrived last Thursday
for a 60-day leave after spending
from seven to eight months on
active duty in Korea. He is staying
at the home of his cousin and his
wife, Mr. and Mrs. Russel Mulholland, and will also visit with his parents, who live in Aylmer.

Pvt. Mulholland, a member of the pay corps, was in and out of the front lines but couldn't recall any particularly exciting incidents in which he was involved.

The 21-year-old lad returned by plane from Korea to Japan and from Tokyo, Japan, to Vancouver; from there he travelled by train. The plane flight was his second and an experience which he enjoyed very much. He said that the weather was good all the way. Most of the flight was at 9,000 feet, but at one time the pilot flew the plane up to 11,000 feet, Mulholland said.

He told The News that it was good to be back home but that he was already becoming restless for lack of sufficient activity.
