The Womens' Institutes of Bruce County were given by The exclusive rights to the promotion, production, selling and licencing of the Bruce County tartan in 1973 by Bruce County Council. In addition, the Women's Institutes also have the rights to the manufacture of clothing, goods and materials made of the tartan and souvenir items decorated with the County of Bruce crest.

It was to the Women's Institutes that members of the Plowmen's Association contacted nearly three years ago to see if it was possible for them to make a huge number of glengarrys from the Bruce County tartan. These are to be worn at and before the plowing match to be held September 28 to October 2 at the Earl Johnson and neighbouring farms near Walkerton.

Since that time, members of the four Institute districts have been busily sewing the glengarrys to have them ready in time for the match.

Bruce County South district of the Institute was the first group to make the hats. with members making 535.
