FAREWELL SERVICE FOR REV. GORDON AND REV. MURIEL CARDER

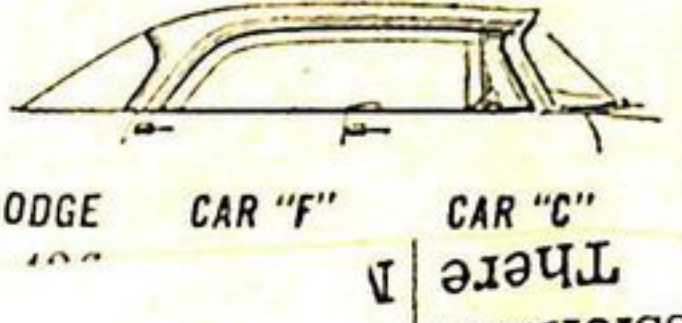

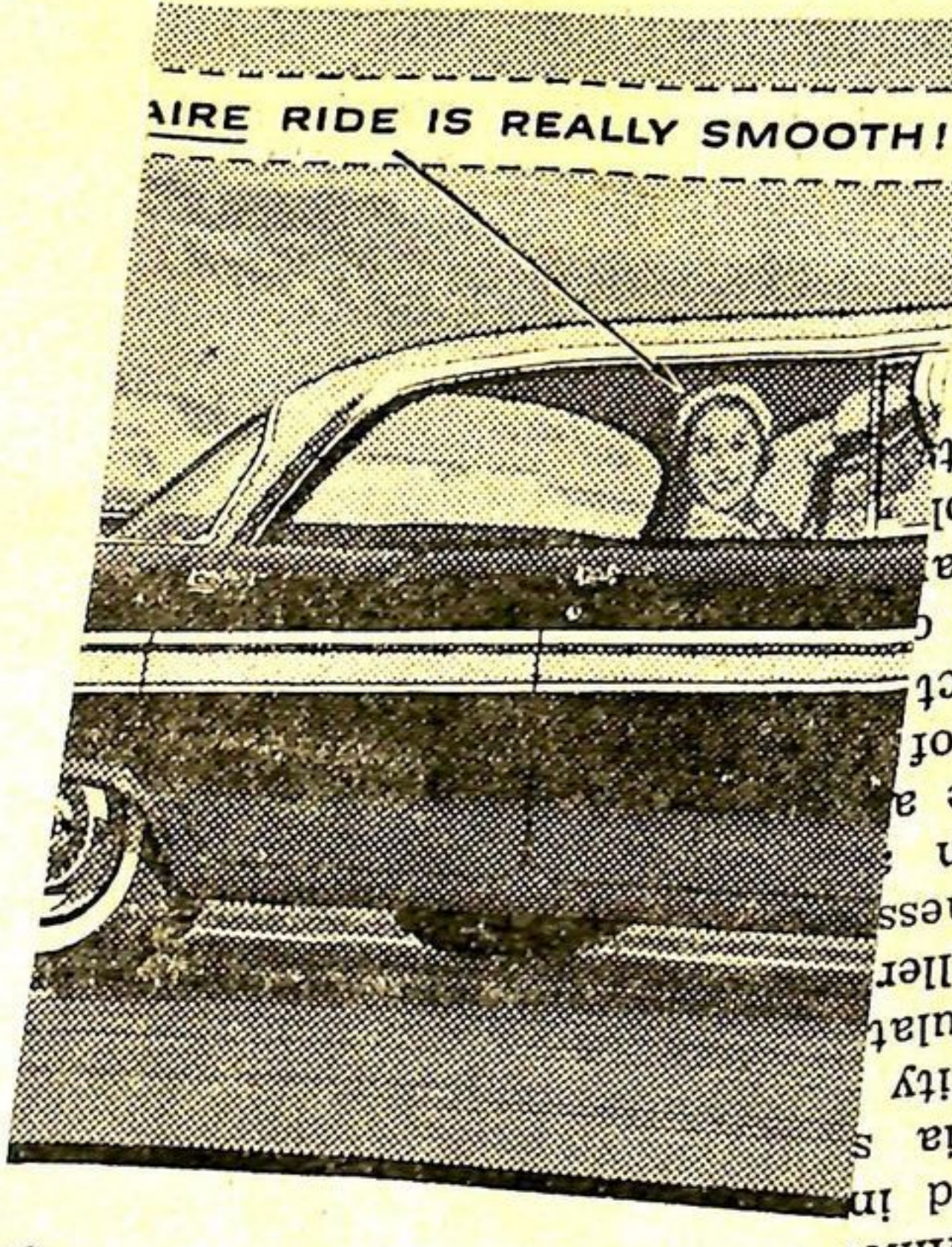
