Friends react with shock to death of Merrifield

The death of Woodstock bookstore owner and Little Theatre worker George Merrifield was greeted with shock by friends and acquaintances Wednesday.

Merrifield, 56, died in his sleep Wednesday morning at his Drew Street home.

Funeral services will be held Friday at 2 p.m. at the Rowell Funeral Home.

Merrifield was well-known for his work with the Woodstock Little Theatre and his Dundas street bookstore, Merrifield Book Shop.

In an interview, Little Theatre president Bonnie Coulter described Merrifield as a superb comedian and a great fan of vaudeville.

He was a particular fan of playwright Neil Simon and had directed Simon's Last of the Red Hot Lovers and Plaza Suite for. the Little Theatre. He was scheduled to direct the theatre's premiere production of the 1979-80 season, Come Blow Your

"He was such a vital personality," Mrs. Coulter said. "He was always a lot of fun and such a witty man."

Elaine Calder of the Little Theatre said Merrifield's death is a tremendous loss not only to the Little Theatre but to the entire community.

"He was such a lovely guy," she said. "News of his death is such a shock."


Mrs. Calder said Merrifield's ambition in the theatre was to act in the award-winning Neil Simon play, The Sunshine Boys.

Gage publishing representative Alex Kuskiz said Merrifield was well liked and respected in Toronto publishing circles.

"We had a lot of dealings with George and his store was one of the best in southwestern Ontario,'' Kuskiz said.

For years Merrifield worked in the administration of various construction companies before retiring to establish the bookstore.

But he still retained his construction expertise and was a full-time teaching master at London's Fanshawe College where he conducted classes in the construction program.

Tom Wakfer, who shared an office with Merrifield at Fanshawe said: "George was well liked by both students and teachers. He will be greatly missed."
