## Rebirth of Elm Hurst spurs new interest in old homes

INGERSOLL — Conversion of the former J.H. Harris home into an elegant dining place by Bray-Ball Associates Inc. has caused an upsurge of interest in the history of Elm Hurst. Sale of the Victorian manor house ended occupation of Elm Hurst by four generations of the Harris family over a span of

more than a century.

The Big Cheese, that focused attention at home and abroad

on the Oxford County cheese industry, was made in 1866 in a tean-to adjacent to the Harris Cheese factory.

Although the tower above the entrance to Elm Hurst is not

open now because of fire regulations, it may be opened soon as a lookout. From the landing you can see Woodstock.

Such towers were built on early Victorian homes with high pitched roofs so repairs could be made to areas too dangerou to reach by ladder. The tower landing was also used b members of the Harris family for sunbathing.

During pioneer days farmers travelling north on what now is Highway 19 walked around the Harris Cheese factory to avoid paying a fee to go through a tollgate located about 10 yards north of Elm Hurst.


