

Dog bites Burgessville man

A Burgessville-area man required numerous stitches in the left forearm Monday evening after being bitten by a dog on a neighboring farm. Peter Fitch, 43, of R.R. 2, Burgessville, had been going around the neighborhood

looking for his own dog which had broken its chain and left his farm several days ago. He drove to the Murray Reeves residence of R.R. 2, Burgessville and finding no one home headed back to his truck. The

Reeves dog apparently broke its chain and attacked Fitch.

According to a Woodstock provincial police report, the large tow-year-old mongrel, will be kept under observation for 15 days by its

owner. Police said the dog has apparently never had anti-rabies vaccinations but is not believed to have the disease.

Mr. Fitch said it was just an unfortunate incident.

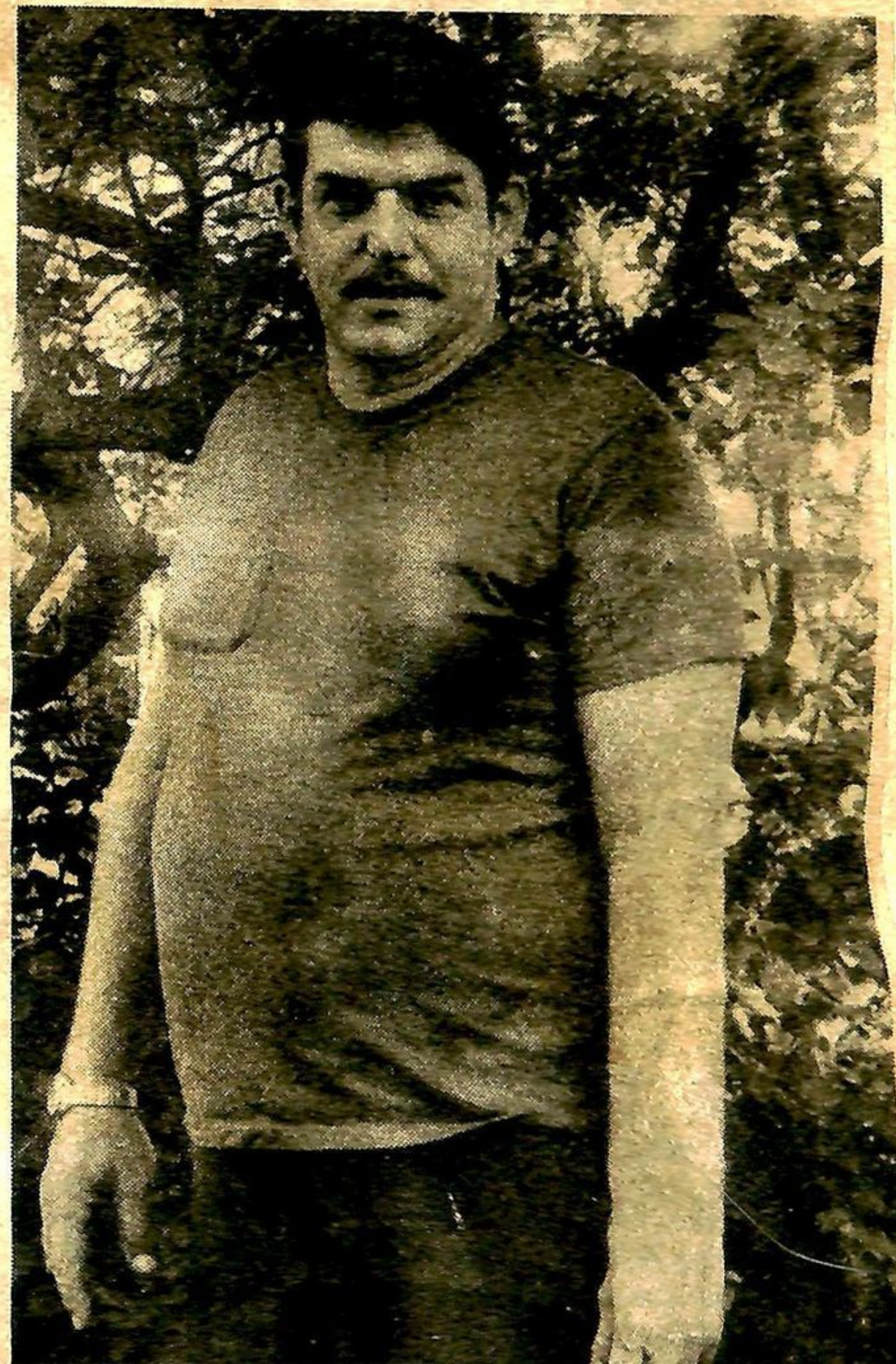
Just a Hint:
