Dorothy Pilkey, formerly of Tillsonburg, has been creating decorative Easter eggs at her home in Burgessville for the past three or four years. But what began as a fun hobby has grown into a major undertaking that consumes several hours a day during the weeks prior to Easter.

The recipe for the large, cream-filled, chocolate coated eggs was given to Mrs. Pilkey by her sister-inlaw and after perfecting the egg, she went into its production on a major scale.

The last two years she has been placing her eggs in the local restaurant in Burgessville for sale and this year will also put them in the local grocery store in Burgessville as well as a restaurant and a retail outlet in Norwich.

One year Mrs. Pilkey, who also drives a rural mail route, put them into the mailboxes of her older retired mail receivers to give them an unexpected, but much enjoyed, Easter treat and to let them know they were being thought of.

She said she usually

creates about 100 of the eggs but will probably make 200 eggs for sale this year. She also gives many of them away, too many, says her daughter Tammy who enjoys sampling the defective eggs her mother considers unworthy for sale.

So popular are her Easter eggs that in the weeks prior to Easter, people begin asking when she'll be making them again.

"People get to expect it," she said.

The process of making the eggs; which ingredients include a blend of icing sugar, corn syrup and butter

for the filling, shaped like an egg and coated in chocolate with decorative icing roses, is a tedious and timeconsuming one, but one Mrs. Pilkey enjoys. It takes about three hours to do one batch, she said, but as she goes on she improves her time and technique.


In addition to the decorative eggs, Mrs. Pilkey also decorates cakes for every occasion.




HARRY CALBERT CARROLL
