The program for the afternoon was held in the banquet room of the Buchaneer with members and guests numbering 64. The Ode was sung followed by the Mary Stewart Collect being repeated. Mrs. R.E. Johnson of Burgessville Women's Institute was chairperson for the program calling on Ruby Buckrell, president of the Burgessville W.I., to give the welcome. The roll call was answered by members telling of some historical event concerning Burgessville.

The In Memoriam for the meeting was given by Ada Morley and Mrs. Fred Newton, with a reading and the lighting of candles, followed by prayer.

Evelyn Waring of Otterville delighted the audience with her whistling of "Down by the Old Mill Stream" and "Daisy, Daisy".

(Mrs. West) formed the first Institute. The slides showed the four main corners beginning with the schools, churches, stores, apple packing plant, North Norwich Telephane System, garages, Grand Trunk Railway, the mail delivery, followed by a fashion show of clothing worn then and some types of homes.
