


TOPS THE POLLS At year's end, new Tory leader Brian Mulroney, shown here with his wife Mila and their abildran had reason to smile

Mr. Harrison informed us that only 25 cheese factories are in operation today in Ontario.

Mr. Harrison moved from New Lawson to Oakville and carried on with his cheese making and supplies many stores all over Ontario. He finished his talk by giving the institute members cheese.

Mrs. Jack McCready thanked the speaker and presented him with a gift. The funds for fun was to pay two cents
