The sleigh upset about five miles east of the village and tipped the Lino into a snow bank. Some Indians cutting wood in the vicinity helped right it and it was brought onto the Gazette. The No. 5 has been in operation every working day since its arrival, but alas time has caught up with her and soon the museum in Norwich will be its new home.

After nearly 40 years of running the Gazette Mr. Winterburn decided to give up the paper in 1946. In the last issue he published the following appeared:

It has been mostly a pleasant task to record all the changes and successes of the people, and to mark the number of young men and women who have gone out into the world from here and

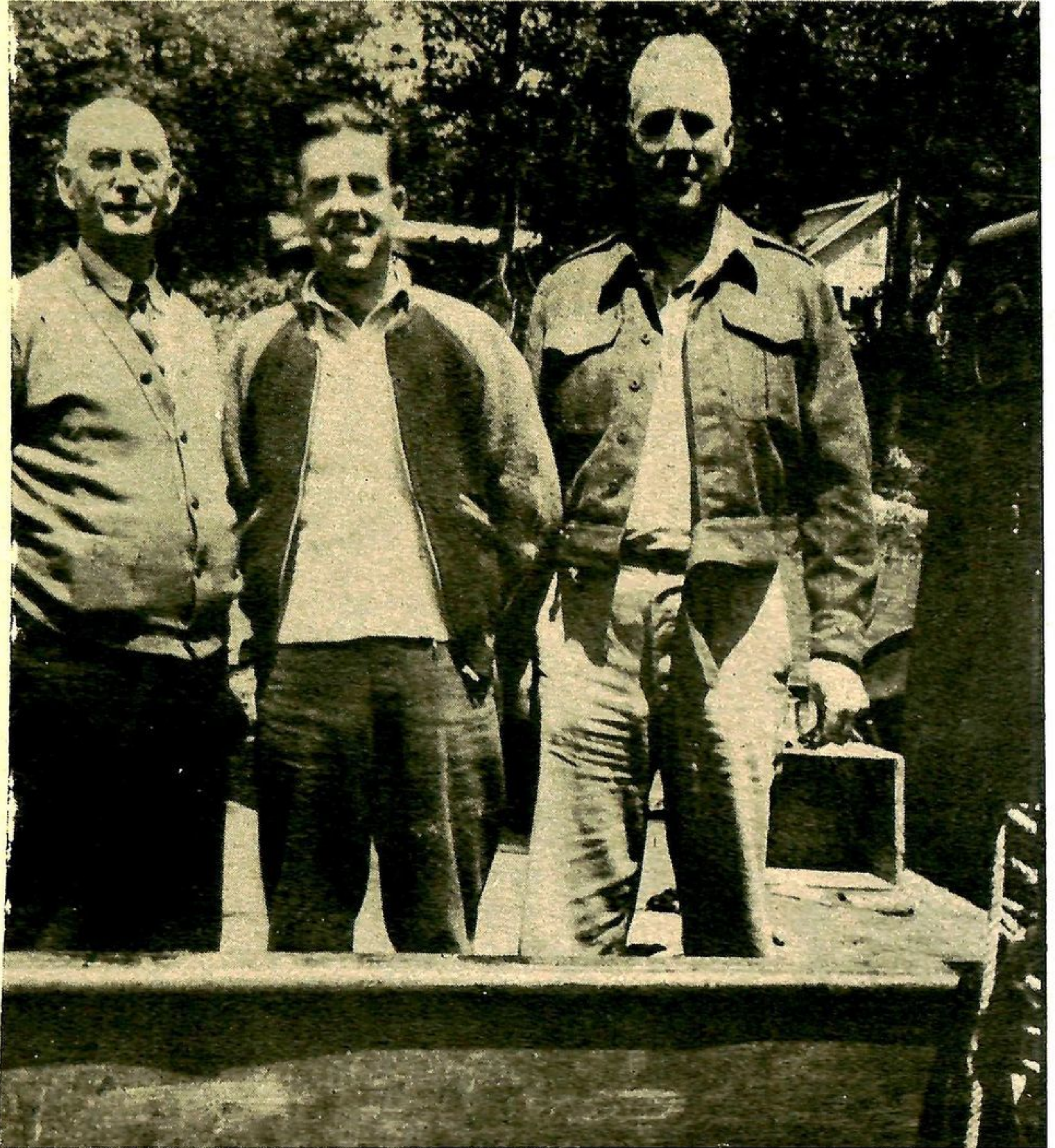
FURIOUS DRIVING TAKE WARNING
