Students' participation in 30-hour famine does make a difference!

As people from across the province look forward to the New Year, Dave Toycen from World Vision Canada is barely catching his breath after a year full of natural and man-made disasters.

"Of course, the catastrophe of the year, and one of the biggest of the decade, was the refugee crisis in Rwanda," he says.

"There are still some 100,000 children separated and orphaned from their parents."

The heartbreak of this past year comes from Rwanda, but also from how this crisis overshadowed other areas of need. East African countries, for example, are languishing under an oppressive drought.

People are already dying from food shortages. The drought forced even Kenya, usually a healthy country, to import more than 11 million bags of grain for massive food shipments this year. Because of the attention to Rwanda, this story has gone mostly untold in the popular media.

However, there is a light at the end of the tunnel.

Students from across Ontario raised \$661,000 last year to pay for long term solutions to some of Africa's suffering.

Their 30 Hour Famine fundraiser supported UN/World Vision immunization programs which have reduced deaths by 2.5 million since



Students also funded agricultural programs to help 50,000 Rwandan farmers return to their land. The 30 Hour Famine is also helping to reforest entire mountain sides in Ethiopia.

"I'm constantly amazed at the generosity of Ontario's youth. The world has a long way to go before poverty is gone, but with caring teens like these we are making a giant step forward."
