The following is an account taken from a newspaper clipping submitted by James W. Wilson: (possibly published in the early sixties)

REPORT ON HISTORY OF EPWORTH UNITED CHURCH SINCE ITS FOUNDATION An excellent report on the history of Epworth United Church was given by James W. Wilson of Woodlawn at the special anniversary services held in the church on Sunday, September 4.

Here is Mr. Wilson's report:
During the years around 1869 services
were held in the church as second story of
the home of Mr. and Mrs. Themas Wilson, on
whose property, the church was afterwards
built. The services were conducted by a
Methodist minister whose name has skipped the
memory of the now oldest survivors of those
days.

The congregation so increased that the house no longer was spacious or solid enough to hold all the attendants. The story is told that one Sabbath when the congregation had gathered for worship the minister was not to be found and on investigation they discovered that he was shut in the "spare room" whither he had gone for meditation and prayer before service. When the congregation had gathered the weight had so sprung the beams as to make it impossible to open the room door. This incident put the people to thinking of building a church. The result was the erection of the present house of worship in the year 1871 or 72 as a Methodist church.

In the year 1889 the building was remodelled and a new pulpit and new seats installed. While remodelling was done services were held in the shed.

The same structure, with the necessary repairs being made from time to time remains to this day.

Since 1925 it has been a part of the United Church of Canada. Here we still gather to study the word of God and meditate on His ways.


May God continue to bless the Minister and congregation as they meet for worship in this church of our forefathers—the pioneers of Fitzroy and Torbolton.


