Thamesford Lions river project


At the Wintario draw on Thursday, May 19, the Thamesford Lions Club unveiled the model of the proposed rejuvenation project for the Thamesford dam and river front area from the CPR Bridge to below the Green Valley Manor, Senior Citizens Apartments area.

The project includes a parking lot on #19 Hwy., a bridge across the river near the Gilbert Fuels Depot, a walkway along the riverbank and under the bridge to the dam. The watershed behind the dam will be drained and two islands created, a sluiceway will be constructed to allow the flughing of the storage area and prevent weed build-up when the area is reflooded. The islands will be linked by a bridge and one of the islands will be connected by bridge to the riverbank.

The model was on display at the arena on Calithumpian weekend.

This massive project will do much to beautify a natural resource that when completed will bring joy to area residents will bring joy to area residents for many years to come.


Art work lost in Thamesford fire
