Mr. Frank Dyer and Pastor Hargreaves attended a meeting at St. Davids United Church, Woodstock to meet with Rev. Crossley of

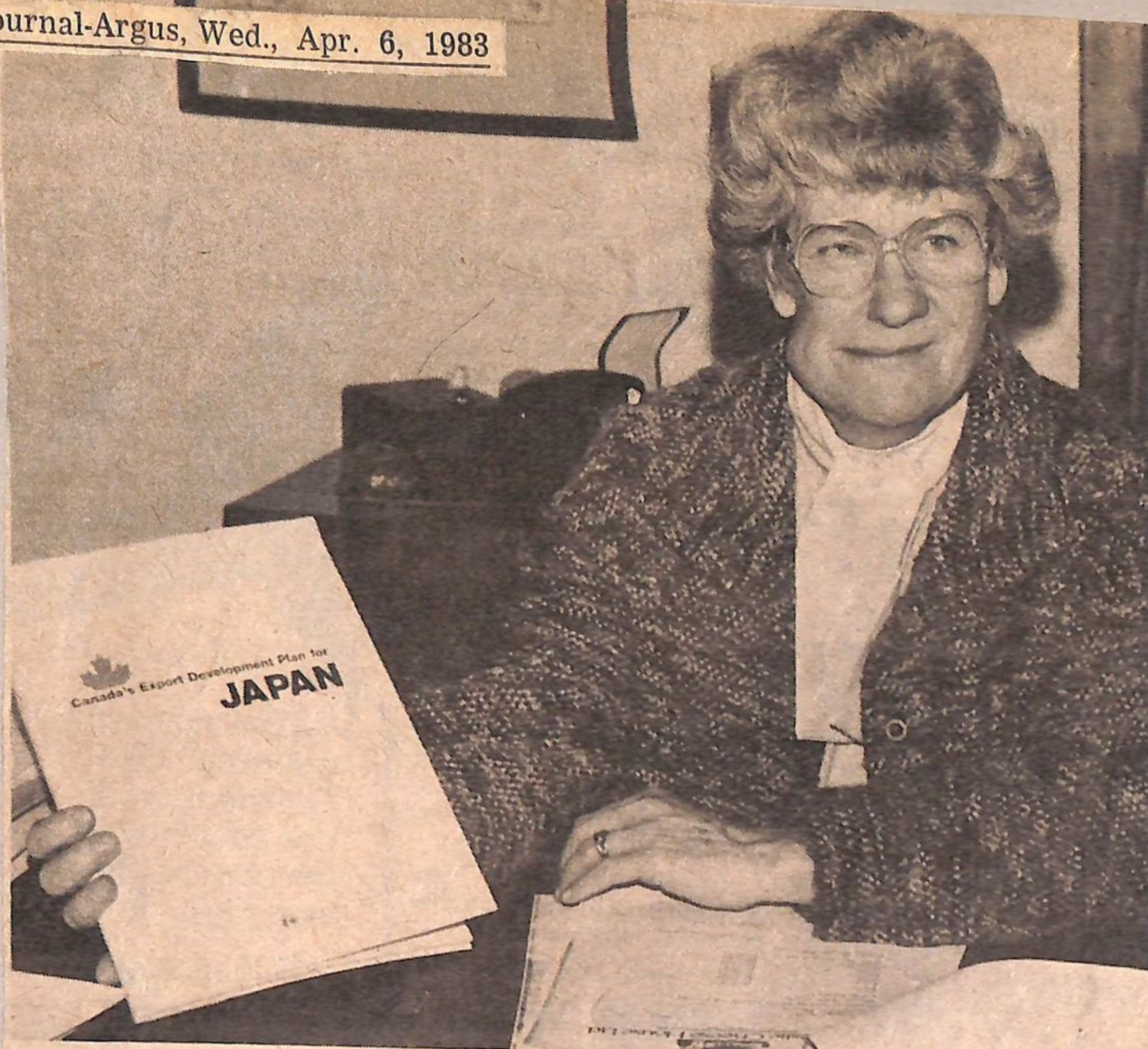
