Rabbit Hunting Popular Sport With Western Ontario Residents

Kintore Hunt Club.

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1. Membership shall be limited to 40. Fee 25 cents.
2. The officers shall be a Captain and an Assistant Captain and a Secretary - Treasurer.
3. Hunts shall be restricted to taking rabbits only.
4. All rabbits killed during the hunt shall be the property of the Club. They shall be collected and put in the truck or car provided for that purpose. All the surplus shall be collected and put to some charitable purpose.
5. The use of rifles during the hunts is strictly prohibited.
6. No person may load his gun until he has taken his assigned place on a drive, and at the close of each drive must unload his gun before approaching other hunters, or coming out to a road.
7. Any person causing damage to private property shall be personally responsible for the same.
