Dec. 1933
1. Membership shall be limited to 40. Fee 25 cents.
  2. The officers shall be a Captain and an Assistant Captain.
  3. Hunts shall be restricted to taking rabbits only.
  4. All rabbits killed during the hunt shall be turned over to the hunt and all be collected and put up for that purpose. At no time shall any person taking part in the hunt be allowed to sell or give away any rabbits.
  5. The use of rifles during the hunts is strictly prohibited.
  6. No person may load his gun until he has taken his assigned place on a drive, and at the close of each drive must unload his gun before approaching other hunters, or commingling with them.
  7. Any person causing damage to private property shall be personally responsible for the same.
