The Soldiers' Monument was unveiled after 31 Aug 1921. 29 Nov. 1921 the money left over from the Red Cross fund was to be used for Sick Children's Hospital, London, Ont.

31 Jan. 1923 Every one was asked for an opinion on What Characteristics in a woman tended to make her noted. The conclusion was that the woman who faithfully did her duty by her children and home deserved renown as much as those who accomplish something which brings them into public notice.

Jan. & Feb. 1923 a Home Nursing and first aid course was conducted.

Mrs. Corbin Pearson and Mrs. Allan Sims then sang "When you wore a red tulip". These girls were dressed in suitable dresses. Mrs. Oliver McGee arranged for the musical number.

30 July 1924 Miss Bessie Crellin was appointed convenor of the young girls sewing class. Those who took the course were, Edna Rutledge, Mary Henderson, Helen Dunster, Mabel Oliver, Agnes McGee, Vera Stainton, Ruby Heron, Hilda Kew, Lillie Steele, Nora McDonald, Ruth Feddery, Marjorie Whetstone, Mildred Lovett, Iola McKenzie. Miss Slicter visited to examine the girls' work.

29 Oct/2 4 The Kintore Institute entertained Thorndale. A debate was held resolved (That a girl of today makes a better housewife than the girl of 50 years ago.) Mrs. B. Brown announced the judges decision in favor of the negative.

27 Jan/28 Mrs. A. McMillan demonstrated the making of a family dessert. This is the first reference I find of demonstration.

At the March meeting 1928 moved by Mrs. Dunlop and seconded by Mrs. McNally that Ruby Heron and Margaret Calder be sent to Guelph convention in May.

Sept. 1928 Mrs. Irwin Robson and Mrs. Jim Woods were appointed to interview Miss Oliver (teacher) about serving hot lunches at the school.
