Princess Anne's son christened at palace

LONDON (AP) - Peter Phillips, grandson of Queen Elizabeth, was christened in the music room at Buckingham Palace on Thursday to the sound of choral singing and his own loud wails.

Court reporters said the 37-day-old child of Princess Anne and commoner Capt. Mark Phillips cried throughout the simple 20-minute service conducted by the Archbishop of Canterbury, Donald Coggan, despite efforts of his mother and the Queen to comfort him.

Peter, fifth in line for the throne, even shed tears during the official photo session later.

The baby was christened in the presence of his royal and commoner grandparents and five generations of royal kin. But Peter himself has no title.

Meanwhile, the British Safety Council awarded its "Booby of the Year" prize to Peter's parents for not using seat belts and other safety measures when driving the baby home from the hospital last month. The prize was for what was termed the silliest act of 1977.

Coggan performed the ceremony in the room where Princess Anne herself was christened 27 years ago.

Oldest among the Royal Family present was 75-year-old Princess Alice, Countess of Athlone, who is the only surviving grandchild of Queen Victoria and the infant's great-great-great aunt.
