Big 5-oh coming up for Highland Games

EMBRO (Staff) — Just another birthday bash on Canada Day, right?

Not quite.

There is a wee bit more to it when you're talking about the 50th anniversary of the Zorra Highland Games, an event that has helped put this village on the map.

Ivan Buchan and Ron Totten, two members on the executive of the sponsoring Zorra Caledonian Society, said Thursday the excitement is already starting to build.

"The 50th is really a milestone," said Totten, whose earliest recollection of the Highland Games is getting paid a penny for every 10 promotional leaflets he delivered to homes in the Embro area almost 45 years ago.

The society members extended an open invitation for people across Southern Ontario to join the celebration, hear the pipers and have a hotdog or two Wednesday.

There will be Highland-style dancing, performances by 10 bands and traditional Scottish

sporting events throughout the day at Matheson Park, Buchan said.

For many, the characteristic skirl of the pipes is what it's all about.

Totten said the tuning up begins early July 1 and gets the day off to a rousing start for village residents, many of whom get involved in organizing the event.

"Many recall hearing the pipes and seeing the bands from our early youth," said Totten as he and other society members sat down at the town hall to regroup.

The 50th anniversary celebration actually gets under way Saturday night with a wine and cheese party at the Embro West Zorra Community Centre.

On Sunday, there will be an open air interdenominational church service at 2:30 p.m. at Memorial Park with performances by the Ingersoll Pipe Band and area choirs.

This year a new event, a 10-mile (16-kilometre) marathon race, will be added to the July 1 competitions.
