
Agricultural engineer with OMAF since 1956

Agricultural Engineer, Bob Milne, has seen many changes since first coming to Oxford County over 30 years ago. Extention engineering work has changed from being a service type function to one that is

now educational and advisory in nature. In addition, the agricultural engineer is today expected to participate in applied type research activities.

Some of the innovative changes have included: the transition from loose housing dairy systems to free stall housing systems, the development and acceptance of concrete sandwich walls in livestock buildings, the overall and ongoing improvements in the area of insulating and ventilating livestock buildings, the development of newer concepts in natural ventilation of livestock buildings, the change from dry manure systems to liquid manure systems and the subsequent development of slatted floor housing systems for swine, beef and dairy, the concern for protecting the enivornment, the development of equipment and techniques to conserve soil from water and wind erosion, the production and use of plastic drainage

tubing, the use of micro computers to assist in management, record keeping and in actually programmmming and controlling the mechanics of performing some on farm job functions.

Changes and developments of these types will continue. The challenge to the farmer is


in deciding which changes can be incorporated into his operation advantageously.
