**Oxford council names 7
to land committee** *1971*

WOODSTOCK — Seven persons were named to a new Oxford land division committee Tuesday by Oxford County council.

County Clerk-Treasurer G. R. Staples said the committee will consider requests for division of parcels of land in the seven Oxford communities without committee of adjustments. He said the permission for the division of land in the seven communities has been considered by the community planning branch.

Named to the committee were Murray Older, East Nissouri Township; Mac MacKinnon, Embro; Howard Neeb, Tavistock; James Shearer, Blandford Township; Robert Lee, South Norwich Township; Albert Cornwell, North Norwich Township and Kenneth Marshall, Norwich.

Approval was given for the payment of land division committee members on the basis of \$30 per full day attendance and \$20 per half day attendance, plus mileage of 15 cents for each mile travelled to and from the hearing.

Mr. Staples said a quorum will be at least three members.

The action was taken by council after the explanation of permissive legislation to have the land division committee was given by Peter Weston, senior planner, subdivision section of the community planning branch, department of municipal affairs at council's November session.

Mr. Weston said the committee would allow decisions to be made on a local level and ease the work load of the department of municipal affairs. Most counties, he said, would have about 200 divisions of land in a year.

Consideration of holding deer seasons over the next five years, proposed by representative of the department of lands and forests, was deferred to council's agriculture committee, for a recommendation at the June 16 meeting.

Reeve John Hofstetter, Blenheim Township, told lands and forests officials more than Oxford county approval would be required. Three or more counties in one area would have to give permission before a deer season is permitted.

Jack Armstrong, Hespeler, district biologist, Lake Huron district of lands and forests, said Waterloo, Wellington, Halton and Brant counties

have voted against seasons, while Wentworth County has asked for recommendations from the townships and Perth county is to consider the subject May 25.

He said Grey County has approved seasons for 1971, 1973 and 1975 and Huron County a three-day season each year from 1971 to 1975.

Harry Gingrich, Hespeler, fish and wildlife deputy, lands and forests, said a special season could possibly be set up for the county with different licences.

Reeve Hofstetter, chairman of the county road committee,

said county road engineer Donald Pratt and representatives of the Canadian transport commission have been asked to make a joint inspection of CNR and CPR crossings on County Road 5, Blandford and Blenheim township line following a petition for a request for improved protection at the sites.

Council approved a road committee recommendation that the county not object to a proposal by Sun Canadian Pipeline Company to construct a 12 inch pipeline in the same right of way as the company's present 8 inch line, across East Zorra, Blandford and Blenheim Townships.

Warden William Ducklow, Reeve of Tavistock, said municipalities of Tillsonburg, Norwich, South Norwich Township and North Norwich Township have been asked to respond to a regional government questionnaire of a Norfolk-Haldimand regional study committee, similar to one prepared by Oxford area study committee.

**New township
crest adopted
in E. Nissouri**

KINTORE — At a special meeting of the East Nissouri Council the council officially adopted their new township crest.

The crest includes a three part shield with sections for the pioneer, farming and conservation.

The pioneers are represented by a plow, farming by a sheaf of grain and conservation by a Canada goose in flight.

The township name appears across the top of the shield with a spray of five maple leaves on either side at the bottom.

The crest which has been mounted on a plaque heads a listing of 75 names of former Reeves, deputy Reeves, township clerks and road superintendents since the township was incorporated in 1850.

The plaque will hang in the East Nissouri council chamber as a memorial to those who served the township.

A number of smaller crests have been ordered which will be available for presentation purposes.
