The programmes for the meetings consisted of music, debates at intervals, essays read which were written for a prize offered by Dr. Freeborn, reading of the "Lion", "extemporaneous" speeches on such subjects as "Catching a mouse", "making bread" + "courtship".

Some of the debate subjects were: -

- "Resolved that music is a greater power than oratory,"
- "Resolved that country-life is more desirable than city life."
- "Resolved that the franchise

should be extended to women in Canada on the same conditions as to men."

"Resolved that intemperance has caused more suffering than war." + many others.
 A concert was sponsored each year on the 24th of May to help defray expenses.

By 1892 - the books in the presses in the Orange Hall were valued at \$473.90.

The library grant from the Govt. that year was \$175⁰⁰, and municipal grant was \$10⁰⁰.
 members fees - were \$25.85.

A reading room was opened for members and in Oct. 1892 in the Orange Hall and \$50⁰⁰ was spent on journals and papers - including London Graphic, Scientific American, Daily Witness, Montreal Daily News - Toronto, Leslie's Weekly, Illustrated, The Canada Presbyterian.
