In July 1896 - the first six of these were discontinued.

In Sept. 1888 an effort was made to establish a "Night-School" and in 1890 Mr. Siger was interviewed and he offered to teach a class of unlimited number for 26 nights for \$20⁰⁰.

In 1891 the night-school was again discussed but the class was never formed.

During the first years of the Mechanics Institute the meetings were held in Moore & Van Dusen's

Hall, at a rent of \$14⁰⁰ per year for hall, light & heat, meetings beginning being held every other week. -
 Beginning ~~on~~ Oct. 8, 1892 the meetings were held in the Grange Hall, rent being \$20⁰⁰ per year, with \$10⁰⁰ extra when the Reading room opened for 2 nights each week. -
 Hall to be furnished suitable for meetings.

In June 1889 a Mechanics Institute stamp was selected for the books, which was very neat in design. -
 The attendance at the meetings in the year 1891 was as high as 88 - 58 - 53, sometimes down to 17. -

The last meeting recorded in the minute-book was on Apr. 10-1906. Secy. pro-tem - Wm. Landlaw. There was a rent debt at that time of \$18.90, so the book presses were locked and the Mechanics Institute's activities closed.
