One morning in May, 1939, Mr. Wittich began an adventure, the culmination of which is one of this areas finest firms, Wittich's Bread Limited of Ayton.

In that first year Mr. Wittich worked alone with the aid of his wife baking in the early morning and vending the fruits of his labour to the local residents. The quality of his merchandise soon became renowned and many were the grateful housewives who were freed from drudgery of a hot summer oven.

Early in 1940 the demand for his wares had increased so greatly that Mr. Wittich was forced to move his shop to a new and larger location on the main street of the village. The next year this site was purchase for the sum of \$1100. At this time the first full time employee was also engaged, Mr. Bruce Sachs, who is still connected with the firm.

This trend to expansion has continued through the passing years until now in the year of its Twenty-Fifth Anniversary, Wittich's Bread Limited has a permanent staff of approximately seventy persons and a working fleet of seventeen large trucks. These vehicles serve a wholesale and retail area of nearly 11,000 square miles encompassing 120 mile circle with its centre at Ayton.

Although its service area has increased to huge proportions, the same spirit of friendliness among Mr. Wittich, his customers, and his staff has not waned. The majority of people employed in the business to-day are from small towns, rural areas and districts which the firm serves. These people take great pride in their work and their main concern is for quality and the pleasure of their patrons.

In this year of their Twenty-Fifth Anniversary, Mr. Wittich and his employees wish to extend their thanks to their many customers and friends, and look forward to serving them for many years to come.
