

A frame house on the Blue Lake sideroad, 10 miles north of Brantford, which was the birth-place of Adelaide Hunter Hoodless, founder of the Women's Institutes, was marked as an historic site Saturday with the unveiling of a plaque erected by the Archaelogical and Historic Sites Board of Ontario.
